along with the Western Native Fishes Symposium and sessions related to native inland trout and coastal cutthroat, will highlight this theme. However, there will be 17 other sessions at the meeting ranging from ½ day to 2 days in length. There will be topics ranging from aquaculture, and aquatic nuisance species, to reservoir management and politics. One of the sessions will be the 10th annual two-day Whirling Disease Symposium. The meeting will wrapup on Thursday with four continuing education workshops.

Although there will be plenty of opportunities for education throughout the meeting, the conference planning committee has organized a bunch of socials and activities to ensure that you have a good time at the meeting. It will not be any trouble to mix some business with pleasure on this trip. Check out the meeting description in this newsletter and you'll see what I mean.

The meeting will be held at the Little America and Grand America Hotels, which are right across the street from one another in downtown Salt Lake City. Room rates are \$80/single room and \$120/double room. The special meeting rates will be honored from Wednesday night, February 25 through Saturday night, March 6. Please make your reservations by January 28 by calling 1-800-453-9450 and make sure you mention the American Fisheries Society to get the reduced rate. The early registration deadline for the meeting is January 30. See the registration information in this issue. Everything you will need to know about the meeting will be available at this site. So, bookmark it and visit it if you have any questions about the final meeting agenda, continuing education workshops, registration, accommodations, tours and activities, paper presentations, or anything else related to the meeting.

The meeting will begin on Sunday, February 28 with a free workshop on parliamentary procedure from 2-5 pm, followed by a Welcoming Social. Meeting registration will begin mid-afternoon in the Uintah Room on the second floor of the Little America Hotel and will continue into the evening. The Welcoming Social will be held on the pool terrace on the second floor from 6:00-9:00 pm. Drink tickets will be included in your registration packet and some hors d'oeuvres will also be provided. So, take the opportunity to mingle with old friends and make some new acquaintances.

There will be a theme-related plenary session at Grand America on Monday morning, followed by symposia and contributed papers for the next 2 ½ days. Beginning at 8:30 pm on Monday evening, there will be an opportunity to view some bootleg fisheries films during the Film Festival. These include *Chub Busters*, a film unceremoniously documenting the largest rotenone treatment in history at Strawberry Reservoir, UT, and *Big Fish More of 'Em.* If you have a film to share at the festival contact our film coordinator, Roger Wilson, at 435-649-9368. A Student Social will also be held on Monday evening in the Presidential Suite.

On Tuesday evening March 2, from 6:00 to 8:00 pm, the Whirling Disease Foundation is sponsoring a social during which poster presenters will be on hand to discuss their research. Drink tickets will be included in your registration packet and hors d'oeuvres will also be provided. Following the social, the band *Slipstream* will perform in a free concert. After the concert, a jam will follow in which all acoustic musicians are welcome to join in regardless of skill level. The band is composed of a variety of fisheries professionals: Matthew Andersen (guitar, bass, vocal), Chris Andersen (piano, vocal), Bill Bradshaw (mandolin), Eric Wagner (guitar, harmonica, vocal, violin), and Cara (violin). The songs range from country western to folk and old-time, with a few acoustic originals thrown in for good measure.

A banquet dinner with raffle and auction is being organized for Wednesday evening at the Union Pacific Depot a few blocks from the hotel. The Raffle Committee is hard at work soliciting a lot of great items for this event. The banquet is included in your registration fee, so plan to attend and close out the meeting with some fun. 



Selected Guidelines for Speakers

A comprehensive list of guidelines for speakers, including suggestions for improving speaking skills and visual aids, will be in the next issue of the Tributary, and can be found at the annual meeting website. The following are requirements that the Program Committee asks speakers to be aware of.

- Presentations will not be allowed to exceed 20 minutes. This includes 1 minute for introductions, 15-16 minutes for the presentation, and 3-4 minutes for questions.
- The only acceptable formats for visual aids are 2"x2" slides or computer LCD projection using Microsoft PowerPoint or Corel Presentations.
- All speakers must check their slides in at the Sawtooth Room (next to meeting Registration in the Uintah Room) on the second floor of the hotel by 8:00 pm on the evening before your talk. We will begin checking in slide presentations at 3:00 pm on Sunday, February 29. Speakers will retain their slides after check-in. A preview room will also be available so speakers can make sure slides are arranged correctly.
- Bring your slides in a labeled carousel to your scheduled room at least 15 minutes before your session is scheduled to start so that AV workers can prepare it for projection and you can receive last-minute instructions regarding AV equipment. Use only an 80-slide carousel. Slides may jam in the larger 140-slide carousels.
- All speakers using LCD projectors must submit presentations using PowerPoint or Corel Presentations.
- All speakers must submit a copy of their PowerPoint or Corel Presentation in the Sawtooth Room (next to meeting Registration in the Uintah Room) on the second floor of the hotel by 8:00 pm on the evening before your talk. We will begin downloading presentations at 3:00 pm on Sunday, February 29.
- Bring your presentations loaded to CD. Zip disks will be accommodated if necessary. Personal laptop computers will not be allowed.
- Save PowerPoint presentations as your last name followed by first name as the presentation title.
- We encourage speakers using LCD projectors to bring a back-up of either overheads or slides in case of problems. An overhead projector will be available in case these back-ups are needed.

A CD will be distributed with the copy of bound meeting abstracts. All authors of papers and posters are invited to submit more detailed information to be included on this CD. 

I have worked with the Gunnison Chapter of Ducks Unlimited since 1998 and am currently the chapter's chairman. I am also a member of the local Knight's of Columbus chapter. I have been a member of the American Fisheries Society since 1997. Growing up in a small Kansas town just north of the Oklahoma border certainly has its advantages, contrary to what some might say. Sure, you might talk a little funny, and chances are, your relatives may be closer than you think. All in all, though, life is pretty good, particularly if you enjoy peace and quiet, and especially if you love to fish. Fishin' will always be a significant part of my life; you could say fishin' is in my blood. My grandfather, Jack H. Martin, was a big-time bass fisherman from Oklahoma who loved to fish. He enjoyed fishin' so much that he created and patented the Martin Lizard, a wooden bass lure with glass eyes that carried its own guarantee, "to get the big ones." Fishin' trips with my Dad to the County Lake and Arkansas River (pronounced Are-kansas, not like the hog state, to set the record straight) are some of my best memories as a youngster. Little did I realize that the small town adventures of a kid deep-rooted in fishing would eventually shape me into the aquatic biologist I am, nearly two decades later.

An early introduction to the great outdoors quickly captured my imagination, and as I grew older, I developed a hankering to be a true (mud) biologist. My first "real" job was with the Colorado Division of Wildlife (CDOW) when I was a sophomore in high school. I volunteered as one of two pilot students for the Rivers of Colorado Water Watch Network (River Watch), a program that involves students monitoring the water quality of surface waters across the state. Such experiences with the CDOW directed me down the path of aquatic biology, and definitely persuaded me to pursue a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology. I began my college career at Humboldt State University in northern California, and eventually earned my degree from the University of Colorado (CU) in 1995. I gained more experience and knowledge of aquatic systems when I accepted a temporary fish biologist position with the South Platte Study Unit of the USGS's National Water Quality Assessment Program. In 1998, I began a permanent position, working for the Water Quality Control Division of the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment as an aquatic biologist. I earned my Masters degree in 2000 from CU, focusing on molecular variation in larval populations of the caddis fly, Arctopsyche grandis. In 2001, I was hired by the CDOW as an aquatic biologist based out of Grand Junction. Currently, my primary responsibilities include evaluation and assessment of western native fishes, implementation of the CDOW's nonnative fish control regulation, and involvement with multiple water quality issues. The Colorado/Wyoming Chapter has three award classifications for recognizing our fisheries professionals and the Awards Committee needs your help in determining qualified candidates. This is an opportunity for you to become involved and see that your professional peers receive the recognition they deserve.

Awards of Excellence

- Significant efforts in the advancement of the fisheries' profession, beyond routine expectations.
- A milestone work contributing to the understanding/conservation/management of aquatic resources.
- Original advancement or innovations in fishery research, culture, or management techniques.
- Significant contributions, via public education and participation to conservation of aquatic resources.
- Imaginative and successful programs in aquatic resource conservation education.
- Leadership in recognition/development of habitat issues that lead to a legislation/policy that protect/enhance the aquatic resource.
- Development of aquatic research, culture or management programs of regional or national significance.
- Important ecological discoveries or new taxonomic criteria.
- New philosophies or ideas that contribute to the understanding or management of aquatic resources.
- This is a lifetime award; therefore an individual may only win this award once.

"MAX" Award of Merit

- "Atta Boy or Girl" award for a job well done, an outstanding effort in aquatic resource conservation, a major contribution to the well being of the fisheries' professions, creation of a new "whiz bang" idea or any act that elicits that warm all over feeling. This award generally recognizes significant short-term accomplishments.
- All persons associated with water resources, regardless of affiliation are eligible for this ward.

Leaky Boot Award

 This is an award for recognition of extreme decadence even beyond the norms for a fish squeezer. It recognizes the most outrageous behavior in the year subsequent to the Chapter's annual meeting. The benefits is to show that all persons have value, even if it's only for use as an example of initiative gone awry. • This award can be given to any fisheries student or professional, even if they might not want it.

Our goal is to make Chapter awards significant and recognize our peers and others that help the fishery and aquatic resource. Please take some time and nominate your peers worthy of such recognition. Include a one-page description of the contributions or accomplishments that qualify the nominee for the award.

Dave Zafft called the meeting to order at 0836. Dave established that we do have a quorum incase we have business that needs voting.

Certification Program - Dave Zafft

Dave Zafft discussed the importance of certification. Rob suggested putting a certification checklist in the procedure manual. Greg mentioned the usefulness of having the Parent Society set up a booth at the SLC meeting that describes the importance of certification and outlines the information required. It might be useful to have completed application available for members to review at the SLC meeting.

 Dave asked everyone to consider applying for professional certification.

Program of Work - Dave Zafft

Dave presented the draft Chapter Program of Work for review and approval. Our Chapters Program of Work was based on the AFS Strategic Plan and the 2003-2004 Western Division Program of Work. 2004 Annual Meeting Plans

As this year demonstrates, the CO/WY Chapter has broken from the long-standing tradition of meeting in Ft. Collins or Laramie during recent years. In 1975, we met in Cheyenne. After that meeting, we alternated the annual meeting location between Ft. Collins and Laramie for 17 years straight, through 1991. The 1992 meeting on the west slope of Colorado, in Grand Junction, was the beginning of an ongoing trend of frequently moving the annual meeting to locations other than southeastern Wyoming and northeastern Colorado.
