I am extremely happy to invite you all to Laramie for the 50th Annual Meeting of the CO/WY Chapter of the American Fisheries Society. After I was elected Secretary/Treasurer, Wayne Hubert congratulated me and wished me luck as a CO/WY AFS Excom member. He told me the experiences would be rewarding, which they have been, but warned me about planning an annual meeting. Annual meetings in the good old days were a day or two long and were held at the local hotel, county fairground, or restaurant. There was a steak fry and a coffee kitty. Meeting registration for our first meeting in 1966 was \$1, there were 26 attendees, and they ended the year with \$12 in the bank. In 1989, the year Wayne was Chapter President and almost 25 years later, registration was \$5 and they ended the year with about \$500 in the bank. In 2016, meeting registration is \$155, we expect 175 attendees, and should end the fiscal year with about \$60,000 in the bank.

George Post was our second Chapter President and stated in his annual message in 1967, "The Colorado/Wyoming Chapter of the American Society has passed a milestone in that we have succeeded in staging a second annual meeting. The first year of such organizations is usually the crucial time and we have passed that hurdle". Over the last half-century, the CO/WY Chapter has grown in all aspects. We now have close to 250 members and three student sub-units. We host top-notch annual meetings with valuable continuing education courses and fund student scholarships, small grants, and travel awards to national AFS meetings. The work that has been presented throughout the years by our members continues to be some of best in the United States. Past-president Post - I am pleased to say that our Chapter has indeed passed that hurdle and then some!

I have had the pleasure to plan an annual meeting that celebrates our rich fisheries heritage. Through that process I have worked to recognize many of the people that have made our Chapter excellent. Looking through the lists of our 50 past-presidents and the hundreds of committee members that have served, it is no wonder our Chapter has succeeded.

To recognize our past-presidents and their lasting contributions, we have invited them all to Laramie for the annual meeting, and it appears that a good portion will attend! We will also host a retrospective symposium that looks back at the Chapter's history as well as changes (or lack thereof) in fisheries management, research, and job duties over the past 50 years. Additionally, we will discuss the history of women in both our Chapter and in fisheries. A pastpresident from each decade will speak about "their times" as an Excom member and current fisheries topics during their respective ten years. They will also participate in a panel discussion following their talks. Steve Facciani, Bob Wiley, Wayne Hubert, Pat Martinez, and Lori Martin have all graciously volunteered to serve on this panel.

The banquet social following the symposium will allow everyone to catch up and reminisce about all the good times we have shared over the years. We will again recognize all who have made the Chapter excel. To those who have been involved over the years, but will not be able to attend this meeting, your contributions are greatly appreciated.

Wayne was correct, planning a gathering of this size has been challenging at times, but I couldn't be more excited about the upcoming meeting that will commemorate our 50 years as a Chapter. With that, I invite you all to Laramie!

Poster Presentations - Please restrict your poster to a maximum size of 3' high (0.92 m) x 4' wide (1.22 m) and have a smooth finish. Poster can be attached to the walls with double-sided adhesive strips or hook and loop (VELCRO®) type fasteners. If using VELCRO®, provide both sides (adhesive backing will be required). You are responsible for providing your own form of attachment. Or posters can be mounted on display boards and displayed on stands, supplied by the author. CO/WY Chapter AFS Awards

Thinking about that outstanding coworker, citizen, landowner, colleague, mentor, or "character"? Know someone who has made a significant contribution this past year to fishery or habitat management, science, or policy...or someone who was involved in an infamous fish folly? The Colorado/Wyoming Chapter has four award classifications for recognizing our fisheries professionals and the Awards Committee needs your help in determining qualified candidates. This is an opportunity for you to see that your professional peers receive the deserved recognition from this society. Please take a moment and think about your professional peers that have made significant contributions and accomplishments to our aquatic resources. It is your responsibility to make sure our professionals receive this recognition.

Award of Excellence: Recognizes (since 1980) an individual who has made significant contributions in the fishery-aquatic resource field. This award was formerly (1977-79) known as Fishery Worker of the Year Award. The Award of Excellence was not awarded last year.

Max Award of Merit: In honor of Max Rollefson (WGFD), this award recognizes a short-term professional accomplishment in management, administration, research or culture. This award evolved from the original Stream Habitat Award (1977-1982) and since 1991 has been broadened to recognize accomplishments in a wider range of aquatic endeavors. Last year's Max Award recipients were Eriek Hansen, Bill Atkinson, Kendall Bakich, Kyle Battige, Jon Ewert, Jennifer Logan, Lori Martin, and David Longrie.

<u>Outstanding Mentor Award</u>: This award will recognize a fisheries professional who has shown substantial devotion to assisting or mentoring prospective fisheries students/professionals, current fisheries students, or fisheries professionals. Last year's Outstanding Mentor Award recipient was Chris Myrick.

Leaky Boot Award: Recognizes the most outrageous behavior of any fisheries student or professional in the year subsequent to the chapter's annual meeting. Please limit applications to one page for the "Max", Mentor, and Leaky Boot Awards. Award of Excellence nominations are typically more detailed with letters of support from multiple individuals. Last year's Leaky Boot recipient was Bill Atkinson.

Raffle



Continuing Education Workshop CO/WY AFS

Continuing Education Workshops will be held March 1. Please register ASAP as workshop capacity is limited and will fill up. We have a smorgasbord of three workshops to choose from this year:

Communicating Science

Scientists need to be able to communicate effectively about their research, in order to educate the public, conduct successful media interviews, and help policymakers make informed decisions. Too often, important research and management projects receive at best a passing mention in the press. This is largely because scientists fail to explain their work in a way that journalists and the general public can understand. This workshop will help bridge that gap. We will cover how to talk about what you do in layman's terms, how to pitch your research or management projects to the press, how to conduct a successful interview, and how to put together a clear and engaging public presentation. This full-day course will be taught by Willow Belden (University of Wyoming Biodiversity Institute). **Registrant capacity = 25.**

Genomics and Ecology of Catostomid Hybrids

Elizabeth Mandeville (University of Wyoming) will present her research regarding the genomics and ecology of hybridization between Catostomids fishes in Colorado and Wyoming river systems. Time will be planned during the session for a discussion on the management and research implications of her work. This will be a half-day course taught in the morning.

Morphological Characteristics of Upper Colorado River Basin Catostomids and their Hybrids

Catostomid fishes of the upper Colorado River basin are declining in distribution and abundance in part due to negative effects of non-native and invasive congeners. We will use photographs and described morphological characteristics to examine putative pure and hybrid suckers. We will then match pictures of suckers with associated molecular identifications to determine potential hybrids. Comparison of molecular and morphological data gathered from the same specimens is the most appropriate method to understand accuracy of identifications made in the field, information which would inform management and conservation of native catostomids. This half-day course will be taught In the afternoon by Kevin Bestgen (Colorado State University) and Kevin Thompson (Colorado Parks and Wildlife).

My interest in fishery and wildlife biology began at an early age. Both of my parents attended CSU and earned degrees in wildlife biology. As a result, most of our family time revolved around the outdoors. Some of my favorite memories involve fishing trips with my father, from fishing for cutthroat trout in Yellowstone, to after dinner trips to local city ponds to catch bass, crappie, bluegill, and sunfish. After working as a park naturalist aid through high school at Bear Creek Lake Park in Lakewood, CO, I knew that I too wanted to pursue a career in natural resources.

I began that career in 2002, attending CSU and working toward a degree in wildlife biology. In 2003. I was hired by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to help raise razorback suckers (my favorite native species!) at the Ouray National Fish Hatchery in Utah. I also got to go on two non-native fish removal trips through Dinosaur National Monument and excursions into the Green and Yampa Rivers to collect native fish fry. After spending the summer in Utah chasing fish, I knew I was hooked on a career in fisheries, and added fishery biology as a major upon returning to CSU. The following summer, I started working as a fisheries technician for the Colorado Division of Wildlife (CDOW) helping rear and experiment with the whirling disease-resistant Hofer strain of rainbow trout. I graduated with a B.S. in wildlife biology, with fishery biology as a second major, in 2006. My work with CDOW led to a master's project examining the effects of whirling disease exposure on the performance of resistant physiological susceptible strains of rainbow trout. I earned my master's degree from CSU in 2009. I continued on whirling disease research, focusing on introduction and management of resistant rainbow trout strains in Colorado rivers, and earning my Ph.D. from CSU in 2013. I was hired by Colorado Parks and Wildlife in 2011 as an aquatic research scientist (salmonid disease research) and continue to research the introduction and management of resistant rainbow trout strains, among other topics. In recent years, I have also had the opportunity to serve on master's committees through CSU and help mentor many new, aspiring fisheries professionals. I believe that focusing on increasing student involvement in AFS, and participation in programs like the Colorado/Wyoming AFS mentoring program, is an excellent way to help these new professionals find lasting and meaningful careers in fishery biology.

AFS has played an important role in my career I have been a member of the development. Colorado/Wyoming Chapter and National AFS since 2006. Since then, I have been able to attend and present at many National, Western Division, and Colorado/Wyoming Chapter meetings. meetings allowed me to develop my presentation skills, share my research with others, and learn more about the great work being done in neighboring states. Interactions with other AFS members, both during the meeting and at socials and banquets, have lead to new experiments, the development of new questions, and some great collaboration with colleagues that I would not otherwise have had the I believe the annual opportunity to work with. meeting is very important for the development of new and current fisheries professionals and the sharing of ideas. If elected, I hope to continue the tradition of hosting fun, productive, and informational annual meetings so they continue to be a useful forum for social and professional engagement. A focus of mine would be to increase funding opportunities and address other potential barriers to attending meetings to increase meeting attendance and participation.

The committee structure of the Chapter is also very important for maintaining involvement and ownership in AFS. I have been fortunate in the past couple of years to be able to serve as both a co-editor of the Colorado/Wyoming newsletter, The Angler, as well a member of the Environmental Policy Committee. Serving on both committees has allowed me to learn more about the great work being conducted in Colorado and Wyoming, including the interactions that occur within the Chapter, the student subunits, and externally, and the important role AFS plays in making decisions for the resource. I am excited to have been nominated as a candidate for secretarytreasurer, for the opportunity to serve as your Chapter officer, and to give back to the Chapter that has helped me in furthering my fisheries career while continuing to promote the standard of excellence exhibited by the Colorado/Wyoming Chapter.

Looking back at the events and life choices that led me down this fishy career path, I can't help but marvel at the fact that I am getting paid to pursue my passion for all things aquatic. My parents love to tell the story of the time my Dad informed me about "the birds and the bees." He took me to my favorite neighborhood fishing hole, sat me down along the water's edge, and uncomfortably proceeded to tell me everything I needed to know prior to entering adolescence. When he was done talking, he turned to me and asked, "do you have any questions, son?" Without breaking my fixed gaze on the water, I asked, "Did you see that fish jump?!" I'm still not sure if my parents tell this story to highlight my love for fish, or to poke fun at my tendency toward distraction, or both. Heck, I don't know, I always trail off when they tell the story and instantly start thinking about fish...

I grew up with my family of 6 (I have three sisters) moving a lot; fishing my way through Texas, Colorado, and Illinois. Two years out of high school, still unsure of what I wanted to do and unaware of what exactly fishery biology was, I enrolled in Wildlife Biology as a major at CSU because I "wanted to work outside." A guest lecture by Dr. Kurt Fausch on the basics of fishery biology in my "Intro to Wildlife Biology Class," became a pivotal moment in my life. I walked into Dr. Fausch's office that same day and said, "this is exactly what I want to do, tell me what I need to do to make it happen." Since that day, I have not looked back and have been guided by strong ambition.

I completed my B.S. in Fishery Biology at CSU in 2005. While at CSU I worked as an assistant in Dr. Chris Myrick's Fish Physiology Lab, primarily

assisting with experiments testing brook trout jumping ability. I then worked two field seasons as an Aquatic Research Technician with CPW (then CDOW) in Steamboat Springs, assisting with research related to boreal toad and cutthroat trout recovery efforts. This was followed by two years as a Research Associate at the CSU Cooperative Research Unit, assisting with whirling disease and endocrine disruption studies. I was in the process of applying for grad school when I landed my dream job as an Aquatic Biologist with CPW (then CDOW) in Meeker, CO in 2007. There, I managed native and sport fisheries in the White and Yampa River basins. That was an amazing experience, but in 2011 I transferred to Fort Collins to my current position as Aquatic Conservation Biologist, where my focus is on conservation of native fish and amphibians of the South Platte Basin. I love every aspect of my job; from working with diverse fish communities of the eastern plains, to working with boreal toads, to planning and implementing cutthroat trout restoration projects. My wife, Alissa, and I live in Fort Collins, where we have embraced the bicycleriding/craft-beer drinking cliché. In May of 2015, we welcomed our son, Byron, into the world, with who we have already begun to share our love for the aquatic world.

Since I embarked on my fisheries career path, the American Fisheries Society has been there every step of the way. I was offered my first technician job with CPW while volunteering as a student at a Western Division meeting in Salt Lake, City. As the President of the CSU sub-unit we resurrected the College Lake Fishing Derby, which had been languishing due to landowner issues at College Lake, and to this day remains the primary funding source for the sub-unit. Serving the Chapter as Membership Committee Co-Chair from 2009 to present, and the Raffle Committee Co-Chair from 2013 to present, insight into Chapter administrative provided operations and annual meeting planning.

I feel extremely fortunate to be in the position I am in My professional success is a tribute to my propensity for teamwork and willingness to dive head-first into sometimes uncomfortable waters, while learning on the fly, and always doing whatever it takes to get a job done right. It is this spirit of dedication and teamwork I would bring to the Executive Committee of the CO/WY Chapter of AFS, while continuing the tradition of well organized and relevant annual meetings. I would seek to continue fostering strong integration among the varied institutions and disciplines. agencies, private organizations that make up the membership of this organization that I owe so much to.






